



GET IN THE SCRAP

Conservation programs had a number of important targets—including metals, rubber, wood, and paper.










Scrap and recycling drives were often seen as ways of involving children (schools, scout troops) in the war effort.

GLEAN - GATHER - GIVE VICTORY

Turn these materials into the channels of WAR PRODUCTION:

- 1. ALL TYPES OF METALS -
 - Steel, iron, copper, brass, old tools, utensils, etc.
- 2. FAT GREASES
 - Make glycerine for explosives, medicines, etc. STRAIN INTO TIN CAN AND TAKE TO NEAREST BUTCHER.
- 3. TIN CANS —

Needed for precious tin and steel. WASH, OPEN ENDS, FLATTEN, REMOVE WRAPPER. IN SALT LAKE, OGDEN, AND PROVO, TAKE TO NEAREST SCHOOL. Rest of state take to grocery store.

- 4. NYLON AND SILK HOSIERY —

 Needed for powder bags, parachutes, etc. TAKE TO NEAREST HOSIERY COUNTER.
- 5. RAGS -

Needed for roofing, shipping cartons, wiping cloths, etc. WATCH NEWSPAPERS and follow instructions on collection.

Corrugated and Card board Boxes and Cartons Flamen them out and tie them in boardles about 12



Wastebacket Paper (Wrappers, Envelopes, Etc.): Flatten and pack fown in a box or bundle, or that it can be carried.






